

News from Oakdale Grove

After a long hiatus since the public Samhain ritual, members of Oakdale Grove met outside with friends of *I Talk To The Trees* and Ross who are interested in learning more about druidry and possibly joining the RDNA & Grove. It was a casual gathering observing social distancing guidelines, and we discussed the praxis of Reformed Druidism. Ross got a bonfire going; he's our longstanding flamekeeper and has no rivals – while *I Talk To The Trees* set up an altar with her chalices.

I Talk To The Trees had the opportunity to practice explaining the RDNA to the seekers (I don't know if they'd want me using their names, so we'll call them the seekers). Normally people tend to defer to me when it comes to describing the Reformed Druid movement, but I think that is a skill that all Reformed Druids should have that are Second Order and above. Knowing the history and customs of one's spiritual movement is important, and I Talk To The Trees has the added experience from being a member of the Toastmasters, which helps you develop oratory skills and improve public speaking techniques. She is one of Oakdale Grove's Third Order Druids, and wants to prepare to enter the higher orders of the priesthood soon.

After an in-depth Q&A about Reformed Druidism and how it compares and contrasts with other druid groups, we held a brief ritual using the oldest known ritual script but added the NRDNA's Vernal Equinox chant just to spice things up. The winds were very talkative on this occasion, so oops, whiskey just happened to fall into the chalices. The Earth-Mother wakes up long before Beltane anyway, and the robins, red winged blackbirds, and grackles have already begun arriving in the northern lands. I also got to meet Mr. Giggles, a three story tall cedar tree with a three-forked top. And he does giggle, it's uncanny.

Bonfire Banter

Overview

Contribution from TheMageiboLine On Justice, US History, and Amazon

Across various druidic or otherwise neopagan traditions, sometimes explicitly stated, sometimes tacitly implied, there is a common understanding of the virtue to justice – Justice for our planet, for our fellow human beings, and for all life as we know it. This kind of ties into possibly the most universal guiding code of ethics throughout human cultures, the Golden Rule: Do unto others as you would want done to you. Throughout nearly every culture and religion, some variation of this maxim is found.

So that brings me to a topic very close and important to me – both to my heart and geographically. I'm talking about the attempts of the Amazon fulfillment center in Bessemer in my home state to unionize. The Amazon corporation has become rather infamous over the past several years for the terrible working conditions present in their warehouses, so much so in fact they earned themselves a South Park episode dedicated entirely to satirizing how miserable of a company to work for they can be. I highly suggest anyone reading this who's a fan of South Park's type of humor to go watch it, even if you're not usually a fan of South Park because it's a very solid episode all around. If you're a podcast listener there's an Alabama radio show called the Valley Labor Report that uploads their segments online on 11 different podcasting platforms including Spotify. From what I've heard from them they've done good coverage of the Bessemer union drive and interviewed several people involved, and does a pretty good job covering what unionization under the RWDSU means for the workers and alleviating concerns and fallacies about the topic.

The truth is none of this is new. In fact even some of the worst abuses of today (well, bearing in mind much worse still takes place by or at the behest of large US-based megacorporations on foreign soil where they can get away with it) often pale in comparison to some of the abuses of the late 1800's to early 1900's US. This again, was nothing new or unique to the US, and every country has gone through similarly oppressive and bloody conflict in their labor history to ours, which all too often is basically swept under the rug and ignored in our history classes. Let's have a quick spill on a still all too little known conflict in West Virginia – the Battle of Blair Mountain of 1921. This August will make for the centennial anniversary of the battle.

It would not be an exaggeration to call this conflict a localized civil war that is never talked about. In short, company towns – already infamous enough for their tyrannical proclivities – ruled in West

Virginia as brutally as the worst modern dictatorships you can think of, and attempts by the workers to unionize would result in organizers being found in a ditch shot dead by the company's hired guns. The company wouldn't stop at anything to suppress dissent and the spread of ideas that threatened their profits and at the time the US government was entirely complacent in letting it happen. As a result the push for unionization evolved into a campaign of irregular warfare of sabotage and ambushes in an attempt by the working citizens to secure their rights and finally a massive battle of 6,000-8,000 armed union men on one side and 1,000-2,000 hired guns of the company and deputized men on the other. This is also the first time in US history bombs were dropped on US soil – by a private plane on the union men in defense of the company. This might be the most extreme example of conflict in US labor history but it isn't entirely an isolated incident either. Many other battles and skirmishes took place as well, not just in West Virginia but in other parts of the US, known collectively as the Coal Wars.

Yet these "Coal Wars" are seldom even acknowledged in a US history class in public schools even in West Virginia, in part for fears it might make the coal industry "look bad." When they are mentioned, it's often as a brief paragraph mention and nothing more.

I've made this spill on US history for a few reasons. For one, it is a reminder of how far we've come, and second, it's a reminder of how bad conditions can become if in our always tempting human penchant for apathy we allow it. It's also a rather shocking example of how our country has a way of whitewashing history when it's uncomfortable or inconvenient to acknowledge, and as the saying goes – those who fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it. For those of you looking for more information on the conflict I highly recommend the Behind the Bastards podcast episodes The Second American Civil War You Never Learned About, parts one and two. From what I can tell the host Robert Evans has done a pretty good job covering it.

As humans I hope we all can agree regardless of our religious or political creeds that the abuses of corporations in the past enabled by a government glad to overlook them are horrific. We should also be careful not to allow ourselves to fall into the complacent thinking that just because things were worse and now they're better – even if we're regressing and normalizing increasingly worse conditions – we should just be glad we're not in the 1920's and suck it up. That is defeatist and demoralizing to those most marginalized and gets us nowhere. And as neo-druids, pagans, or other spiritual people who believe in the virtue of justice and dream of helping to better the world for all, it is my firm belief we have moral duty to stay vigilant and support those in their struggle for better lives.





Meanings

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program, however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

A Reformed Druid Anthology – ARDA (2nd edition)

<u>ARDA II</u> is an 848 page PDF of RDNA history, customs, meditations, debates, rituals, advice, and other information. If the massive PDF file is too big, it is also broken down into its individual sections which makes for easier scrolling <u>here</u>. There you will also find part of an ARDA study course and other documents. The books in hardcover version are rare and out of print, but the PDFs are free.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Finder spreadsheet</u>. It's been updated *en masse* the last two Januaries during the Grove censuses, and if there are any interim changes I usually get to them within two days. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar was technically at year 0 during the pre-planning stages of the Reform, and year 1 began on Beltane (May 1) of 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2020, the 58th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began. I often forget what Y.R. it is, so I refer to the RDNA Year Conversion spreadsheet. There is also a four-year RDNA calendar to help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Black Book of Liturgy

The original 1960s copies of Black Book of Liturgy (which were in three-ring binders) were only to be kept by ordained Third Order Druids, but mimeographed copies leaked out decades ago, and we think that's a good thing. Oakdale Grove has a new adaptation of Black Book of Liturgy (PDF) with a ton of rituals as well as minimum recommended readings from ARDA. Black Book of Liturgy is also available in <a href="https://hardcover.org/ha

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America as well as for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.
