News of the Groves

News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

On Saturday, Oakdale Grove gathered for the Autumnal Equinox and held our annual Grove elections for the traditional RDNA offices of Preceptor, Server, and Arch-Druid, and the supplemental office of Bard. The office of Bard is not a required officer position in the RDNA, but popular to add-in for Groves & Protogroves alike. All the officers retained their incumbency. Some Groves institute term limits for their officers, but for small Groves that's a bad idea where they'd quickly run out of eligible candidates who have already served more than the maximum number of terms according to their constitution.



There were six members in attendance on a beautiful fall day. The spirit of the east very strongly answered our call for omens, despite all four spirits giving answer. The carnyx, a replica Celtic war horn we use to call the druids to ritual, is in need of some moderate repair. The copper crest on the head of the beast is coming detached in two places. One because of metal fatigue and the other due to the solder bond failing. I have copper rivets but I just need to bore some holes and hammer the rivets through. The head of the carnyx, a sort of stylized rabid horse, could also use some new glass eyes. The original red decorative glass beads turned out to be clear glass painted red, and most of that paint has chipped off. I just need to find real red glass somewhere.

News on behalf of Carleton College Grove

The new academic year has begun at Carleton College, and luckily the Arboretum is still open to the general public despite the buildings being closed to visitors. There is even a sign along the trail with a QR code that leads to a comprehensive visitor experience survey. The inscribed Druid Sigil that has silently adorned the altar stone on the Hill of Three Oaks for the last five decades is slowly faded from the gradual erosion of the large but soft feldspar granules in the otherwise hard granite stone. Allegedly the sigil has been redefined periodically over the years, so it could probably use a good re-engraving of the circle at least.

Right now Carleton College Grove is technically a Protogrove, as it does not currently have a Third Order Arch-Druid since most of the upper ranks had graduated this last spring. If anyone from Carleton Grove is reading this,

we're nearby to help if & when anyone is ready to carry on the tradition of Reformed Druidism at Carleton. You are at the birthplace of American druidism, after all.





The Right Rites For Rampant Ritualists

Overview

This section is for sharing rituals, devotionals, or other liturgical contributions.

What's in a Grove Constitution?

Ok so maybe this one isn't entirely about rituals, but rather what makes up a *Constitution* or *Grove Charter* in Reformed Druidism. In the RDNA, to have a formal Grove, the members must vote to adopt a constitution and elect three Grove officers: Server, Preceptor, and Arch-Druid. There's plenty of room for variation and creativity when formulating a constitution, though there is a general pattern which can readily be used as a template to base your Reformed Druid Grove on. Protogroves may also establish a constitution, though heavy use of the word "Provisional" is recommended. You may use this as a resource when founding a fellowship of your own!

Reformed Druid Grove Constitutions are typically divided into six or seven articles outlining the information.

Article 1: Defines the fellowship's location, name, which branch of the Reform (RDNA, NRDNA, ZDNA, etc), and the date the fellowship was formed. The date is sometimes indicated in Article 6. Sometimes Article 1 only contains the name and branch, while the rest are in a preamble above.

Article 2: Defines the parameters for admitting members (agreeing to the Two Tenets of Reformed Druidism), as well as defining minimum requirements for maintaining an active membership status. Membership dues can be mentioned here, but are generally not recommended.

Article 3: Outlines the Two Basic Tenets of Reformed Druidism in the format preferred by the fellowship. Sometimes this is Article 4.

Article 4: Defines the offices of the fellowship and their general duties. For Protogroves, add the word "Provisional" or Latin phrase "Pro Tempore" to each officer role. Grove constitutions should define the roles, prerequisites, and requirements of: Server, Preceptor, and Arch-Druid. Supplemental offices can also be defined here. Protogroves can skip this or even use alternative offices such as Cup Bearer, Secretary, and Liturgist (or others). Exceptions for appointing a temporary officer if someone is absent

Article 5: Defines the fellowships election criteria, such as the time when officers are elected, length or limit of office terms (term limits aren't recommended for small fellowships or you'll risk losing your own eligibility for office). There is a very common phrase on most constitutions here "only those qualified may be nominated." This section also often defines the method of voting, whether by voice, paper ballot, Athenian Jars, etc. Mention of tie-breakers by bardic duels would also be suitable in this section.

Article 6: Defines a quorum, or minimum fraction of active members that must be present in order to vote on officers or legislative changes. The quorum historically ranges from one-eighth to up to two-thirds. Carleton Grove's quorum is only one-eighth which may sound low, but if your fellowship has attendance issues, you might want to avoid a high quorum. One thing that feels universally "Reformed" is that the constitutions have always been voted upon twice before they are considered official. I think that is to allow the maximum number of members to cast a vote, especially if you have a high quorum. This section, or sometimes as Article 7, will also indicate the certification of the Arch-Druid who is establishing the Grove.

Below is a sample constitution of a fictitious Grove in the Reform.

Lunar Moon Grove Constitution

We, the druids at the Armstrong Lunar Colony, in order to make more fruitful our existence, upon Samhain of 2063 in the 101st Year of the Reform, do hereby enact this, our Constitution.

Article I

The name of this fellowship shall be Lunar Moon Grove of the Reformed Druids of the Earth-Daughter.

Article II

One may become a member of this fellowship upon presenting a petition stating they believe in the Basic Tenets of Reformed Druidism as set forth in this Constitution. Members, in order to be considered active, must attend no less than two Grove events per calendar year.

Article III

The Two Basic Tenets of Reformed Druidism are these:

- 1. The object of the search for spiritual truth, which is a universal and a never-ending search, may be found through the Earth-Mother, which is Nature, but this is one way among many.
- 2. And great is the spiritual importance of Nature, which is the Earth-Mother; for it is one of the objects of creation, and with it we do live, even as we struggle through life do we come face to face with it.

Article IV

There shall be three officers of the Grove:

- 1. The Arch-Druid shall be ordained in the Order of Dalon Ap Landu, shall preside over liturgical services and ordinations, and shall be the principal officer in matters of the spiritual.
- 2. The Preceptor shall be at least a Second Order Reformed Druid, shall assist in services, and shall be the principal officer in matters of the secular.

3. The Server shall be at least a First Order Reformed Druid, and shall assist in liturgical services.

Article V

Democratic elections of officers shall be held by ballot annually upon Samhain. Only those qualified to hold the offices may accept their elected posts. The Arch-Druid reserves the right to appoint a pro tempore substitute for an absent officer should the need or request arise.

Article VI

This Constitution may be ratified by a majority vote in two consecutive meetings of this organization. A quorum, which shall be no less than three members but at least one third of the active membership, should be present in order for voting to be carried out for elections and major decisions.

Article VII

I certify this to be a true and accurate record of Lunar Moon Grove's Constitution of the Reformed Druids of the Earth-Daughter, declared and approved at two consecutive meetings by a quorum of the membership, and signed by:

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program, however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Finder spreadsheet</u>. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America, its branches, and for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.


