

...On Acorn Hats

Do you know how hard it is to find a knit acorn cap hat for adults? It's harder than organizing druids! Every now and then someone brings up the notion that druids need some unique sort of hat. Something that would aid in identifying your fellow druid when going to a *casual* meetup for tea where full-on ritual garb might just draw too much attention. *The Book of Opposition* in ARDA mentions wearing "sacred cone-hats of bright colors" but I think that refers to birthday hats, which might not send the most accurate signal. An old *Missal-Any* article mentions everyone getting straw hats, but what kind? One might wear a porkpie hat while another comes in a gardening hat while everyone else wears a cowboy hat. Berets were suggested once or twice though it sends a quasi-militaristic signal, and allegedly those are already used in some white-supremacy circles, so let's just skip berets altogether.



Acorn knit caps, however, do exist, and they'd be perfect. One problem though; they tend to be solely marketed to, and sized for *infants*. Now druids are those who "know the oaks," and acorns are just oak nuts that contain the seed for a future tree. So I get it. I understand why knit acorn caps are marketed toward infants – they're just an itty bitty thing that's gonna grow up and be strong like an oak someday.

We see grown-ups wearing all sorts of silly hats. Fleece jester hats are quite warm, and increase your visibility in the bleakness of winter. I see adults wearing them not just for form, but for function. Some adults are wearing full-size hats with bearlike ears sticking out the top (not recommended during hunting season though). Lots of our winter hats have pompoms on top. But why are there no acorn cap hats for grownups with a leaf and a little stem on top? I've found baseball caps with embroidered acorns on them. I've even found hats with the *word* Acorn printed on them. How inane. **Finally at long last, I found a knit hat that's sort of like an acorn cap by Camptrace,** though they don't call it an acorn hat. I might just have to go get some craft felt and add a leaf & stem to the top myself.


A Survey from Kaifi / Kynan

Book Review from John the Verbose: World Druidry by Dr. Larisa A. White

In 2018 I had participated in the World Druidry Survey that was created by Larisa White, who is also a member of OBOD. Well the survey results are in and analyzed, and earlier this year she published her book! This was really eye-opening to see insights into the differences between members of the major druid orders, as well as the summations of what we have in common. Solo druids and members of minor organizations are also represented. In all there were 725 participants who completed the survey.

I learned many different perspectives, including some of the vastly different practices of druids in desert and tropical climates, particularly where the seasonality departs from the expectations and customs of traditional druidry. New Zealand druids in particular seem to be highly syncretic and have some of the most unique practices that adds a dynamic layer to their spiritual experiences.



I was surprised by the seemingly low participation rate of Reformed Druids, with only 6 participants indicating their affiliation with the RDNA, given that there are an estimated 4,500 Reformed Druids globally. AODA seems to have grown considerably in recent years. Before I ever joined any druid order, I had researched them and I think at the time there were little over 200 members in that order. As of 2020 there are evidently over a thousand members now. The other major druid orders used in primary comparisons were OBOD, ADF, BDO, and TDN.

The book often breaks down statistics of aspects of druid beliefs, practices, and areas of focus according to how frequently they occur among members of the major orders. So if you're looking for which druid order might be a best fit and you know what you believe, what you practice, and what you're looking for, this book would be a powerful tool to help point you in a fair direction.





Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program, however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Finder spreadsheet</u>. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America, its branches, and for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.


