The State of the Groves

Overview: The listing of all currently active Groves and Protogroves of the RNDA, NRDNA, and MOCC (formerly RDW) has been updated as of July 2022! Thank you to all those who run a Grove or Protogrove and responded to the inquiry this year! The last time a census of the Groves and Protogroves was taken was January 2020, which was supposed to be the start of a great decade in our imaginations. The pandemic has absolutely taken a toll on the fellowships of the Reform. We skipped having a census in 2021, but interest is ramping up again, and it's generally safer considering druids like to be outdoors anyway. In 2020 there were 32 active fellowships in the Reform. As of July 2022 there are now only 21 fellowships.

The listing of the active fellowships is still on the <u>Grove Finder</u> spreadsheet on a shared Google Drive and will still be updated for the time being. Last year I was trying to work with Stephen Savitzky about giving the rdna.org website a major overhaul, but that project hasn't been implemented. For now, Oakdale Grove has its <u>own website</u> with the design I had intended for the RDNA site. There is where the future of the RDNA online will live. My vision that I implemented on my own site is that each fellowship in the Reform can be given one informational webpage. Below each Grove and Protogrove will have their webpage linked for people to read the full details of each fellowship. That's much nicer than the Grove Finder spreadsheet, and also provides room for a few paragraphs about the groups, rather than a 70 character blurb. It also has a placeholder for a Grove or Protogrove Constitution if the fellowships choose to fill it out.

Here are the updates for the active ones:

News from Carleton Grove (Minnesota)

Carleton Grove is technically a Protogrove at the moment, as they have indeed entered an interregnum period without a Third Order Arch-Druid. They have at least one member, and it will be an uphill battle to regain formal Grove status. Carleton Grove members, you just need to know that Oakdale Grove is not that far from Northfield and willing to help you build back up, and hopefully before next May which is the 60th Anniversary of the RDNA. There's gonna be a reunion at Carleton!

News from **Emerald Grove** (Washington)

We may not always hear a lot out of Emerald Grove of Seattle, but despite the difficult times, they have grown to 92 members, breaking their own record for largest fellowship of the Reform!

News from Our Lady of the Elms Grove (Oklahoma)

This MOCC fellowship is intermittently active with 8 members in the Muskogee-Warner area.

News from <u>Tuatha De Danann Grove</u> (California)

This Hayward-based NRDNA Grove is active with 5 members.

News from Clan of the Triplehorses Protogrove (Oregon)

This Medford-based group is active with 6 members.

News from Dravidia Protogrove (Maryland)

This Protogrove in the town of North East is still active with 1 member.

News from White Rabbit Grove (Wisconsin)

This Grove in the Driftless Area is active with 1 member.

News from Our Lady of the Oaks Grove (Oklahoma)

This Tulsa-based MOCC fellowship is active with 14 members.

News from MOCC Fort Worth Protogrove (Texas)

This fellowship is forming in the Fort Worth area with 1 member currently.

News from **Shrine of the Irish Oak Protogrove** (Arkansas)

This fellowship in Waldron has been active since 2004 and has recently formally declared the group to be an RDNA Protogrove! This fellowship is active with 4 members.

News from **Blackthorn Protogrove** (Kentucky)

This Louisville-based fellowship is intermittently active with two members.

News from Poison Oak Grove (California)

This Grove in Canyon is active with 1 member.

News from Koad Grove (Ohio)

This Toledo-based Grove is active with 3 members.

News from Our Lady of Holy Wisdom Grove (Oklahoma)

This MOCC fellowship in Seminole is active with 14 members.

News from Dogwood Protogrove (Virginia)

This protogrove serves the Tappahannock area with 2 members.

News from <u>Circle of Flowing Truth Protogrove</u> (Florida)

This fellowship is new to the Jacksonville (Lakeside) area and expects to be intermittently active with 2 members currently.

News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

This fellowship is active in the Twin Cities and has grown to 15 members this year.

News from <u>Grove of the Golden Valley</u> (California)

This NRDNA fellowship is intermittently active in the Sacramento area with 3 members.

News from <u>Tucson Protogrove</u> (Arizona)

This fellowship in Tucson is active with 4 members. I have a feeling they'll be a Grove by this time next year!

News from MOCC Fort Smith Protogrove (Arkansas)

This fellowship serving Fort Smith and the Springdale area is forming with 6 members.

News from MOCC Mindanao Protogrove (Philippines)

This fellowship is the only active group of the Reform that is overseas, currently forming with 3 members.

News from (I can't say yet!)

I've been bursting at the seams with excitement since around the end of May, but there's something happening and I just can't announce it yet, so here's a teaser.

The Losses

Since the start of the pandemic, the Reform has lost 11 fellowships. Most have been lost due to unknown circumstances because the organizers have not returned contact. It's been over a month since the census inquiry was sent. It would have taken less than two minutes to complete, and I asked for responses within 14 days. I also created a poll to ask what a response time should be when seekers are reaching out to contact modern alternative spirituality groups. The poll results indicated that 91% say they would expect a response within a week or two. A third specified it should be within a few days tops. This is just something to consider if you're running or planning on running a druid group. The following are the fellowships that have been closed or lost contact.



Hazelnut Mother Grove (HMG)

• This one was a bit heartbreaking. Like it's namesake, this was the Mother Grove of the NRDNA. All NRDNA fellowships have to report in to HMG and hold regular meetings in order to maintain their active status. I am uncertain what will happen to the last NRDNA Groves going forward, or if there was even a contingency plan in place outlining which Grove takes over now that HMG has dissolved. It might necessitate a bardic competition

between Tuatha De Danann Grove and Grove of the Golden Valley!

Monument Grove

This one really hurt to mark as *lost contact*. This one in DC was run by 30th Carleton Arch-Druid emeritus Mike the Fool who might secretly be an American James Bond. He last checked in with the Council of Dalon Ap Landu on May of 2020 indicating he was overseas and safe, but in a rather cryptic way. I have faith that he'll show up again at the proper time and at the proper place. There was the time in 2016 he called me from an Egyptian cell phone number and asked me to meet him in the Carleton Arboretum. Yeah, my phone literally said "Egypt" and I'm glad I answered! Where are you, Mike?

• Order of the Mists Protogrove

Served Rock Springs, Wyoming

Nine Oaks and Mystic Well Protogrove

Served Las Vegas as a women's study group

• Earth Spirit Protogrove

Served Ridgecrest, California

Golden Bough Protogrove

Served Joshua Tree, California

Three Stones Protogrove (NRDNA)

Was a daughter group of Nine Oaks and Mystic Well Protogrove, also in Las Vegas

Whispering Winds Through the Willows Grove

• This one has been a mystery because it was led by a "Rev Earthdragon" who, back when he was still maintaining contact from Battle Creek, Michigan, never answered our questions as to who his Third Order ordainer was, and there's no Earthdragon craft name listed in our roster of Third Order druids. Now Earthdragon is no longer returning contact at all.

Akron Protogrove (MOCC)

• This one has actually closed due to the organizer moving away from Ohio

AZ Protogrove

Served Black Canyon City, Arizona

With the loss of these 10 fellowships, 94 members of the RDNA, NRDNA, and MOCC have been displaced. It is not unreasonable to conclude that some of those 94 members may have passed away in connection with the pandemic. In fact I do know that to be the case with at least one fellowship's organizer last summer.

Campfire Colloquy

Contribution from John the Verbose

In Defense of Ritual

I recently received this question from a reader on my blog:

stoneandwire asked: Overall what is the purpose of these physical things such as being tossed in a river or other "rites of passage" during initiations in the druid orders? Overall what does nearly getting injured by being tossed in a lake without knowing what is down there have to do with improving yourself spiritually? This has been one of the main reasons I think so many "pagans' today do not see the need for formal rituals where they could be hurt. Overall, why is there a need for such physical stuff when its supposed to be a spiritual journey?

Rites of passage are a fundamental aspect of spirituality, and arguably a necessity in our human experience. Most world religions will place some sort of emphasis on *mind*, *body*, *and spirit*. Solo spirituality without rites of passage are great for perhaps the mind, but without the physicality (body) or that moment of transformation and new beginning (spirit), it leaves us with a void, or an emptiness which we might not even realize we have.

Imagine graduating college by just passing your finals and the office sends you an email saying you graduated with honors and that's all you ever get for it. That email serves as your degree, proven by a mere confirmation number. For those expecting some sort of ritual to mark the occasion (a grad ceremony with gold cords, or at least a fancy paper degree), they would say "Wait, that's it? That's all I get?"

Imagine just getting a marriage certificate at the county registrar and never having a wedding ceremony. Imagine leaving a loved one's burial to the state and never having a funeral. Ok yeah, some people do that. Your personal spirituality should not be neglected in this manner though. *Most* people *need* to mark these occasions with a transformative event.

Visualize your spirituality or religion or whatever you call your practice as a three-legged stool. It is held up by a philosophy or set of beliefs, has some form of ritual or set of practices (i.e. rites of passage), and community, whether that's just you solo (yes you can be a community of one) or a bunch of people. If you take away one of those legs, the stool cannot stand. David the Chronicler stated something similar,

though he originally omitted *community* even though he was writing to a fellow druid at the time after they had both established new Groves (communities) in their respective areas:

- 1. It is mine observation that religion is composed of two parts: the philosophy and the ritual. Should either be absent, there is no longer religion.
- 2. For without the philosophy the ritual is but playacting; and without the ritual the philosophy lacks the warmth and vitality, which is capable of perpetuating it beyond its originator.
- 3. For there is in all men a certain desire for the glory of ceremony.
- 4. Often it is indulged in for its own sake, as in the case of secret organizations and in the worship of the state (which is often confused with patriotism).
- 5. For ritual is capable of crowding all else out and becoming the end in itself. It is for this reason that we are constantly threatened by the Druid ritual shedding its philosophy and becoming mere playacting.
- 6. I am persuaded that our philosophy is valuable, for in Nature we have found a peace and a fulfillment that was otherwise lacking.
- 7. But we have also recognized that ritual is most often a hindrance; and to eliminate it is simply to encourage non-ritual to become the ritual. Rather as Druids we have endeavored to build a ritual which will be the destroyer of its own importance.
- -Epistle of David the Chronicler 3:1-7

That last line may appear self-defeating, but what David means is that it's not ritual for the sake of ritual. We don't get hyped up that a ritual is *happening*, but that we ought to focus on the *fulfillment* we gain as a result of the ritual.

Rites of passage also have a three-legged stool. Without needing a new picture just visualize the following

- 1. **Separation:** You as the candidate (or sometimes there are more than one) are singled out for this occasion; the focus is on you, and you are about to leave an old part of your life behind
- 2. **Liminality:** During the rite, you are in a transitional phase; the rite itself takes time and you are going through a process of change
- 3. **Incorporation:** At the end of the rite you have reached a new beginning; perhaps you gained new insights or had something bestowed upon you or reached the end achievement and now you apply these changes on the path ahead

Rites of passage have a profoundly positive effect on those who complete them, and even modern psychologists are increasingly lamenting that our modern society is lacking in these rituals. The rite you are asking about is the ordination rite to the Order of Sirona. In the entire 59 year history of Reformed Druidry, this ritual has only been done twice, and it's really the only RDNA rite that has an element of danger. Well there's also the Order of Hephaestus which requires the candidate to jump over a fire nine times, but Hephaestus is Greek, and the Order is considered a non-canonical "side order" of the priesthood. We also have designated spotters for this rite of passage, which is exactly why community is important!

Safety is important, and we will be as accommodating as possible. If we can hear thunder in the distance, the advisement is to reschedule. As druids embrace nature, we will have our rituals in the sleet and rain, but we really try not to endanger each other. For future ordinations to the Order of Sirona, it would be strongly urged to find a body of water that is known to be safer in general, perhaps at an actual designated swimming beach.

Just remember that any contact information you submit to this section does become public. Your email address in the newsletter will be split apart and will use different characters (& and /) instead of @ and '.' to prevent or mitigate random harvester bots from scanning them for spam.





The Right Rites For Rampant Ritualists

Overview

This section is for sharing rituals, devotionals, or other liturgical contributions.

The Importance of Elections in Reformed Druid Groves

If there's any ritual tradition your Grove should do, it's holding elections for the offices of **Server**, **Preceptor**, **and Arch-Druid**. This is so foundational in the RDNA, it's not even in the *Book of Customs*. It's in *The Book of the <u>Law</u>*. Carleton Grove's constitution states that elections for officers take place annually during *Foghamhar*, or autumn (Law 1:11). Groves have the autonomy of outlining when and how often to hold elections. Maybe every other Beltane, or New Years Day on prime numbered years, or every New Moon. Whatever you put in your Grove's constitution, adhere to it.

How to Carry Out Elections

There's no wrong way to have elections in the RDNA. Ok that's not true; blindfolded darts would be a very wrong way to elect officers! If you want, you can even specify your method in your Grove's constitution. Common methods include:

- Show of hands
- Voiced selection
- Written tallies on a sheet of paper
- Paper ballots (probably one of the better methods)
- Athenian jars (placing a pebble in a jar designated for your candidate)
- Facebook, Twitter, SurveyMonkey, or other online polls

The important part is that the officers should be eligible to hold their nominated office, and they should be *selected* by the members of the Grove. This means that making a deliberate *choice* for the candidates is important, and not something to be left to the whims of a divination or to the chance of a coin or dice. The ancient tribes of the Celtic Iron Age would choose someone to be their druid. Although we are completely disconnected from the ancient druids and are *Reformed*, we still adhere to that custom of having the people choose who they want their Arch-Druid to be.


Artisan Promo Page


2023 Minnesota Nature Calendar

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program, however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Finder spreadsheet</u>. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.
