News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

Ice Cream Social: The druids of Oakdale Grove have been keeping rather busy this year, consistently having at least one casual meetup per month in addition to the eight Wheel-of-the-Year high day rituals. Last month we had our ice cream social in a regional park and chatted about our upcoming officer elections; an RDNA requirement for maintaining formal Grove status. Next month we have several events already planned so that we can spread the word earlier in hopes that some of our events might align with member schedules, so that they have additional opportunities to spend time with like-minded individuals.


Upcoming Grove Elections: Our ballot also has *five* legislative questions to vote on: whether or not we will become a *Druid Alliance of North America* affiliate group (in addition to primarily retaining our RDNA affiliation), whether or not we make the office of Bard official (requiring an amendment to our charter), whether or not we increase attendance requirements for *voting member* status in the Grove (also requires amendment), whether or not we increase attendance requirements for Officer candidate eligibility (requires amendment), and whether or not we would adopt *bardic duels* as a legislative utility (requires amendment).

Twin Cities Pagan Pride: Two Saturdays ago members of Oakdale Grove were at the Twin Cities Pagan Pride Fall Festival, where Oakdale Grove and an allied group: *Northern Roots Grove* (an independent local druid group) shared an informational booth as "Druids of the Twin Cities." We raffled off a druidry starter kit – a gift basket of items donated by both groves such as candles, herbs, chalices, a book, a specialized calendar, crystals and other items. Proceeds will go toward the rental cost of the *Druid Hospitality Suite* at the 2023 Paganicon event next March.

Three of us hosted a *Druidry 101* panel discussion. TCPP encouraged us to create

a PowerPoint presentation which I spent a few weeks of my free time creating, and they provided the projector as well. I was skeptical that a daylight presentation inside a white tent

would not be conducive to an effective visual aid unless it was an especially bright projector. I would have loved to see it in use under daylight conditions first, because you could hardly see anything being projected. The tent would have needed black



In the afternoon, the two Groves combined powers and held a ritual to celebrate unity and send healing energies around the world. Oakdale Grove's carnyx did a heck of a job to summon



the masses to gather. Everyone loves the big weird horn! We invited the ancestors, nature spirits, and the deities, making offerings to each. The main work of the rite was a Tonglen meditation: breathing in the bad, and converting it to good. Radiating peace, kindness, and love with every exhale. We got some good feedback at the end, and whether it was the ritual, the panel discussion, or our info booth, we had a lot of interested people stop by, wanting to learn more about druidry, all with great questions.

Volunteer Litter Removal: Last weekend on Saturday, members of Oakdale Grove went to Carleton College to participate in some ecological activism: volunteering for litter cleanup along the Cannon River in the lower arboretum. At first we remarked that to the credit of the students at Carleton, they seem to care a lot about keeping their own college campus clean and pristine. Though we did begin to find a fair amount of litter and

trash. The longer we were out there cleaning up, the more we started to realize that *most* of the trash littering the riverbanks were from townies that fish along the riverbanks on campus. Concentrations of litter seemed to have a running theme of *fishing paraphernalia*, and we deduced that probably not many Carleton students do much in terms of fishing.

minutes. We were thoroughly soaked, and afterward the sun came out and it just started to get hot and humid, and we had to remember that the *results* are the reward for the hard work.

Bonfire & S'mores: On Sunday we had a more relaxed casual event for Oakdale Grove, which was

just a bonfire to hang out, talk about druidry, and have a few s'mores. It was a quiet turnout on an overcast day, but there were lots of good questions



asked, plenty of mirth, and some really good s'mores! There are still a lot of s'more supplies, so we will bring them to the Autumnal Equinox ritual this coming Saturday at Oakdale Nature Preserve, and other members will get to have some after the ritual and to celebrate Oakdale Grove's 9th anniversary!

All has been growing in sun and rain


The cattle and chickens will all watch on While Brigid and Goddesses lead in song





The Right Rites For Rampant Ritualists

Overview

This section is for sharing rituals, devotionals, meditations, or other liturgical contributions.

Mixing the Waters-of-Life

In Reformed Druid rituals, the sacramental *Waters-of-Life* which is what we call our consecrated whiskey, is almost always diluted. The exception being for Second Order consecrations, in which the candidate partakes of the Waters "to their fullest extent" (Customs 3:12) meaning an *undiluted* full chalice. Use a smaller chalice, so that perhaps 100 mL is full enough (two shots, no more). I was recently asked what the ratio is supposed to be. Admittedly I said I estimated that it was about 1/3 water, but only by eyeballing it. One third is possibly "incorrect" but more on that in a bit. That was easier to do when before the pandemic we all shared from a 12 oz chalice. The smaller vessel made it easier to guess where the invisible 1/3 line was. My 48 oz pitcher on the other hand changes shape and diameter for every inch of its height, so it's much harder to guess, especially given its larger size.

So what can we do? Well, we've got options!

For a time the druids of Carleton Grove used a double-spouted cruet with the ratio pre-measured before they left for ritual. Personally I don't trust cruets like that because they're usually fragile glass with stoppers that I wouldn't trust in a car ride to the ritual site. Lots of aesthetically pleasing options though if you want to go that route for a ceremony at home though.

Another obvious idea is to bring a measuring cup! There's a surefire way to be exact. If you think measuring cups are unappealing, you could also use a small clean chalice as a measuring cup if you use a pitcher to consecrate and distribute the Waters. Its consistent size might not give you an exact volume, but your ratio will be close enough overall. Less effective but relatively fair would be to count the seconds of a slow pour of water and then multiply that for the slow pour of whiskey. If you have thirsty grovemates, another trick is to pour a whole 750 mL bottle of whiskey in the pitcher on top of a miniature (8 oz) bottle of spring water. That's 31% water which is "close enough" for a high-day ratio. Smaller Groves... uh, just bring a funnel and pour the unused mix back into the bottle.

About That Ratio...

Is the water supposed to be 1/3 (33.3%) or 1:3? Remember 1:3 means one part water *in addition to* three parts whiskey, making four parts total, or 75% whiskey. Even ARDA says the ratio is a matter of controversy. On high-days it's 1:3 being mostly whiskey, and if you have rituals in between it's supposed to be 3:1 being mostly water. This is not a hard rule, really just guidelines that allow for estimation. Oh and don't buy *Glass Manor* whiskey, it's trash.



Lodging Information

Don't bother trying to book at the **Archer House Inn** anymore. They bulldozed the ruins last year after the 2020 fire. It was an iconic building and a block away from the edge of the Carleton College campus. It was a great haunt for the druids, and had superb restaurants in it. Now only the ghosts can float above the bricks.

Now the closest lodging is an extra block away: **Fairfield Inn & Suites** with prices hovering around \$150 per night (has pool). If you want a good balance of relative proximity and price, I would recommend the **Country Inn & Suites** with prices hovering around \$140 per night (has pool). If you plan on having your own car or a rental vehicle, you could drive the extra mile to the **AmericInn** with prices under \$100 per night (has pool). Lastly and a bit farther there is Coratel Inn & Suites with prices under \$75 per night (no pool).



Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

Non-Gmail Users Have Two Ways to Contribute


There is a <u>lite version of the same form</u> for those who don't have a Gmail account, which allows anyone to submit text-based contributions only.
