It rained for a few days, and we had a few uncharacteristic peals of thunder, which is rather atypical of Minnesota in November, though now that I think about it, in the last 15 years or so we've been getting a few November storms when previously light rain or snow had been the expectations for our climate. They didn't bring a chalice, but since mine was clean I offered that they could use my chalice, and that I would drink from the pitcher after everyone else had been served. Book Review: <u>The Modern Day Druidess</u> by Cassandra Eason

Before we get into the book review, I've been on a quest to find druidry books that plainly state "anyone can be a druid" or something to that effect. And that's true and valid: *anyone* can practice modern druidry. Though there's a persistent problem in the limens of the community where there are those who say that you need to be born into druidry or must at least have Celtic blood in order to practice it. That sentiment is false and is strongly linked to *folkish* druids who have the same issues with race that have been leaching into the Norse, Heathen, and Asatru communities for decades. In those communities such individuals might identify themselves as *folkish* (among other demonyms) as an innocuous way of identifying each other based on their extreme ideologies.

This unfortunately has also become true in the druidry community as well. I've been taking part in a collaborative effort to find affirmational statements that clearly state that druidry is an open tradition. Granted there are initiatory denominations of druidry, but as a whole anyone can practice it in its generic form. I can imagine we won't change the minds of the racists with scans of book passages from druidic authors, but they've already had the effect of polluting the minds of young individuals who would like to explore druidry. The folkish druids have gotten into social media platforms such as Discord, Tumblr, and TikTok, and they're turning people away *en-masse* with the rhetoric of having to be Celtic. *Celtic* isn't even a genetic term. It's about a hodgepodge of Iron-Age communities from Western Europe to Asia Minor who shared a common *material* culture, not a common *genetic* culture. Ultimately this project is about the seekers who were given the wrong information, and to *show* them that they are welcome to explore druidry if that is what they desire, **but I digress.**

On with the book review!

I recently finished reading *The Modern Day Druidess* by Cassandra Eason, and right on page 2-3 it says "People of all cultural backgrounds can find kinship within Druidic ritual and celebrations of the passing year." It was a bit longwinded for what I was looking for, and it spanned a page break which is a bit unfortunate for scanning just that line for showing prospective druids who think they "need" Celtic blood in order to practice.

So in a world that daily gets gy and faster travel, people of

all cultural backgrounds can find kinship within Druidic ritual and celebrations of the passing year.

The book has aged mostly alright in the last 19 years, but with minor inaccuracies or omissions of key details of variable significance. There were a handful of times where I asked out loud why certain parts were left out. I was put off by the sheer number of times

Cassandra green-lights cultural appropriation. A number of times she mentions smudging, and buying from *ethnic shops* because they're *cheap*, not because it helps minority-owned businesses.

The book can sort of be reinterpreted into a gender-neutral context. She's happy to have male readers. She states that plainly, and that everyone can get something out of it. For it's time it wasn't a bad introductory book. But the target audience obviously is *cisgender* women with no mention of transgender or nonbinary spirituality – but such were most books written all those decades ago. As we emerge into the second quarter of the twenty-first century, I personally feel that there are much more up-to-date introductory books to choose from that are more inclusive than this one.



Book Review: Exploring Celtic Druidism by Sirona Knight

This one turned out to be a bit of a wild rollercoaster ride among the books I've read about druidry. The basis of this book is from *Gwyddonic Druidry*, which allegedly had high priests in the tradition as far back as the 1600s. A source cited includes the <u>Greater Book of the Art and Craft</u> from 1650, and that the *Gwyddonic Druid College* was founded in the late 1700s. The order is initiatory, and related to *Welsh Rite Gwyddonaid* which the author indicates is "Welsh Wicca." At this point I didn't know what to believe and was skeptical of everything she was writing, particularly because Wicca wasn't invented until the mid 20th century by Gerald Gardner. Therefore I am also skeptical of the provenance of the *Gwyddonic Druid College*, especially as Googling such tends to only show references to this book.

The author consistently uses the Crowleyan misspelling of magic. You know, the one with the K at the end, when these days all the authors are saying that *nobody is talking about parlor tricks* in pagan books about magic, and to just use the standard spelling thereof. There's also the time she states that Ceridwen created Cernunnos (both spelled with Ks according to her). I think I missed the part of Welsh mythology where Ceridwen went to the Iberian peninsula to create a Gaulish god – this to be read sarcastically of course. She also misrepresents historic facts, indicating that Siculus had visited Stonehenge. If he did visit stone circles in the British Isles, the ones he mentions are more likely to be in the Hebrides or the Orkney Islands (in reference to the Hyperboreans). I nearly threw the book when she said "the Romans and Christians systematically exterminated the druids" (p. 29) which is only half true in terms of the former, not the latter.

She really only scratches the surface of all the topics she introduces. Chapters are subdivided into small sections that end abruptly, leaving the reader wanting to know more while the book just plows ahead. If anything it inspires further reading, or I should hope so at least. The author also has a very bad habit of mixing pantheons, sometimes without even indicating who is from what culture. Artio is mentioned but is not even identified as being Gaulish. In one section she name-drops Camulos, Epona, and the Morrigan without mentioning they're Gaulish and the Morrigan is Irish. This is hazardous in a book that says it focuses on a Welsh tradition. She says Sucellos carries a large spear

and is the Dagda's twin. Wow. First Sucellos is Gaulish, thank you very much, and the Dagda is Irish. The Irish mythology does not mention Sucellos, and besides he carries a mallet with a handle as tall as a person, not a spear!

This book also pushes cultural appropriation by instructing the reader on how to do a smudging, but it is not one of the proper New-World indigenous methods. She also goes into using totems without explaining the origin of the Ojibwa word *totem* or without using any of the European words for totem either. Oh, and I bemoan the dangerous medical claims in this book! I paraphrase: *Illness and disease come from our emotional pains and are our own fault because we haven't resolved those issues for ourselves*. That's toxic mumbo jumbo. My asthma is not the result of unaddressed emotional strain. She doesn't add in any disclaimer about first seeking modern medicine or professional medical advice.

If you don't mind getting your European mythologies in a jumble, this book is for you! If you want druidry that smacks of duotheistic Wicca, you're gonna want it! If you've ever had a Furby this book will also give you flashbacks. There is some RDNA compatibility though: Gwyddonic Druidry follows a matron theology and even mentions the Earth Mother. She frequently mentions the practice of "Merging" which is basically achieving a temporary alpha state of mind of heightened relaxation, becoming one with Nature. In some cases it sounds like the RDNA's achieving a state of *Awareness*.

Overall, <u>Exploring Celtic Druidism</u> is a bit dated, sections are too short, the book leaves out too many important things, and I was just glad it was a large print book which made for a quick read. It's a bad read for the unwitting newbie and a terrible read for those who know better.



Book Review: Living Druidry by Emma Restall Orr

This is the most refreshing of my recent reads. Emma encourages druidic minimalism (or perhaps it's minimalistic druidism, if there's a difference – hard to tell since I'm paraphrasing based on context). There's an interesting rebuke of dualism, claiming that it's a theologically Christian concept. It might not be entirely accurate of her to say that but as a sweeping generality she gets her point across. She also asserts that Nature spirituality does not require supernatural beliefs, which is a great affirmation for agnostic or even atheist druids. She also mentions that we don't need to use magic the way Wicca needs it, but rather magic is not the *means* of druidry, but rather the *result* and we're just here to observe it doing its own thing without our influence or interference. She also encourages exploring solo druidry, since we individually know what is best for ourselves.

The part about "consensual pain" on page 156 started a series of sections that really threw me off from the rest of the book. Emma carelessly promotes various forms of self-harm as parts of rites of passage, claiming pain is a divine force of nature causing the chemical responses in our body to help us feel like a whole new person. There were no trigger warnings there, and no reminders of monitoring

your own safety, or knowing your limits, or not having a sitter to observe or help if something dangerous goes wrong. Emma also covers the use of toxic substances, then contradicts herself with a blanket statement that *druidry does not promote drug use*. I think that's great advice, though perhaps among the diversity of druidisms it might not be an accurate assertion anymore.

Overall the book was informative and lovely to read. At times I felt like there was a bit too much fluffy filler. As if Emma originally wanted to be more concise, but the editors told her to make it a full 200 pages, because that seems to be an auspicious page number for books these days. If she did seem to start rambling of things she already covered, it at least had the effect of being descriptive and thorough, which is great for new readers. It meandered like a river, which is druidic in its own way I suppose. The book takes a hit for the brief self-harm content, but as long as the readers use common sense, they'll probably be fine.


2023 Minnesota Nature Calendar

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.
