A Letter to the Editor from Seaglass

About your geomancy divination.

In the previous newsletters you had pictures of what your divination tools were with the result being shown. But in this season so far when using geomancy you are only showing the chart. I looked up geomancy but with the chart it seems like a complicated system, and I gathered that it needs four readings of staves or "druid sticks" to start the chart. Do you use druid sticks or dice or maybe a random number generator to get your chart started for the reading? Can we see? :)

A Response From the Editor

Dear Seaglass,

digress.

Thank you for your inquiry. That's actually been something that had been at the back of my mind ever since I settled on displaying the geomantic mound chart instead of my stones – and then sticks. For the past few years I have been using small tablet-like "K2" stones, which are essentially granite stones from the K2 mountain in Pakistan that contain blue stains of azurite. K2 is probably one of the least imaginative names for a mountain, but I





I always felt like I was going to break my stones by shuffling them. They make such a high pitch glasslike clinking sound that I just didn't really want to keep using them despite having ground them into approximately the same size and shape for the purpose of using as geomantic staves. Even though the *geo* in



geomancy has to do with drawing the symbols in the surface of the Earth to create the chart, I initially felt like geomancy should be done with rocks instead of sticks.

Eventually I decided to buy a handmade set of "druid sticks" so that I'd actually have something that are actually sticks. I usually hesitate to call geomantic staves *druid sticks* because there's no archaeological evidence that druids ever used this method of divination. Rather, it was widespread throughout the Near East, Middle East, and northern Africa, and wasn't widespread in Europe until after the time of the druids had come and gone. I

purchased these sticks from *BrokenVial* on Etsy, and they're really pretty. I think they said these were upcycled from an old oak baseboard trim, so no new trees were killed in the making of this divination tool.




2023 Minnesota Nature Calendar

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America, its branches, and for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.
