News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

This past weekend a few of Oakdale Grove's members attended *Paganicon*, which seems to have become the largest indoor pagan convention that I'm aware of. Oakdale Grove was pitching in on sharing the "Druids of the Midwest" party suite, which we sponsored along with members from other regional Groves, Protogroves, and solitaries from various other druid orders such as OBOD and ADF, and Northern Roots Grove, a local independent druid group. The convention's overall theme this year was "Metamorphosis & Transformation." We didn't want to be cliché and make our



entire theme *butterflies*, so while we were in the pre-planning stages someone joked that our party room should have a werewolf theme to be different. We all laughed at the notion, then greenlit the



idea. Then the whole weekend we had a life-size werewolf mannequin in the party suite. What will the druids think of next?

The Druids of the Midwest party suite will likely have to adjust its name for future Paganicon sessions, as we also had druids representing from Montana and Tennessee. All the more because we met some California druids from the Wild Druid Collective who used to be regulars at Pantheacon. This was their first time at Paganicon. They said they loved it so much that they hope that they can

party suite. I absolutely loved conversing with them, and also hope they can come back in the future! The party suites are open to all attendees at the convention, but there's something different about being able to share in hosting a suite that it feels like a "home room" while you're there enjoying all the events over the weekend.

The party suite itself was host to a number of unofficial events, from an LGBT pagan meet & greet, to casual discussions about druidry and the Groves being represented, to the Ogham Bingo session that I led which helped people learn the pronunciation of the Ogham alphabet and its tree associations in a fun way (with prizes). Jean Drum held a lunar praxis seminar on a range of simple things druids can do to incorporate the moon into a regular personal practice.

Next week is the newsletter's annual *Mwfydnfud* issue, celebrating the ancient holiday beloved by so many. What is Mwfydnfud, you ask? It makes sense to let it shift naturally to April Fool's Day, which is (apocryphally) the date in 1963 when David Fisher sat down in Goodhue with a few friends to start hashing out the whole *druids* prank. And given that humor is important in the RDNA, Mwfydnfud and/or April Fool's Day ought to be just as major a holiday as Beltane.

Book Review: <u>The Circle of Life Is Broken</u> by Brendan Myers

Brendan's latest book is a compelling clarion call about the climate crisis. He states that these are his *meditations* on the subject. The author is a druid, but it isn't a book about druidry. If anything, it falls under *philosophy* and *ecology*. Druidry ties in throughout for obvious reasons, though. From the start it is a captivating revelation of the tragedy that society has become. It suggests a harsh reality that we have done too little too late, that perhaps we may have been beyond Earth's ecological tipping point for some time already. He posits a paradigm shift that there never has been a *balance* in the natural world, but that everything is only *chaos* that happens to oscillate in apparent cycles, merely resembling a balance. Brendan expands upon his definition of the *Circle of Life* throughout the first section, revising it periodically with nuanced refinements. This book is teeming with classic Reformed Druidism. Reformed Druids have long-mentioned the *continual flow and renewal of life*, which essentially *is* the Circle of Life.

Brendan mentions a meditation method called "The Aesthetic Attitude" which is going into nature with disinterestedness: meaning we aren't trying to accomplish tasks or gain something other than *just* appreciating it for what it is. He states, "I can appreciate the World of Earth for its own sake, and then perhaps the answers to my questions will find me." He also reminds us that, "If you have been given a world of beauty and wonder, then you have also been given a world of danger and terror." That statement paired with the section title "Who Faces the Circle of Life?" reminded me immediately of the Second Tenet of Reformed Druidism: *And great is the spiritual importance of Nature, which is the Earth-Mother, for it is one of the objects of creation, and with it we do live, even as we struggle through life do we come face to face with it. That struggle is an indication that Nature isn't all puppies and butterflies, and helps us stay vigilant of the reality of a perilous world.*

There's a section on modern societal euphemisms that force certain anthropocentric attitudes in the forefront of our perceptions. One of them reminded me of a euphemism I learned in college that has always bugged the heck out of me: "tax delinquent land," or *wild natural spaces that aren't earning money* for the economy or revenue for the state. Moreover I think it's *previously exploited* land that has re-wilded itself. Calling Nature "tax delinquent" is infuriating to me. Nature ought to remain tax exempt.

Brendan points out that our shift from childhood to adulthood has a disenchanting effect between nature and us, where societal expectations pull us to participate in the sterility [magically speaking] of a productive civilization. We need to find that sense of enchantment again as a society, not just as individuals or druids. He encourages us to become – and recruit more "Earth Keepers" in all levels of society, while warning vehemently against Ecofascism. We must not resort to Ecofascism, and to outright banish any Ecofascists among us. He states "Hatred cannot save the Earth, for hatred cannot heal." In all, this new release is very current and hyper-relevant now. There's still time to save the Earth in his opinion, but we need to grow as Earth Keepers, globally nonpartisan, as our entire existence is in the balance. This book is definitely worth the read! **\pm****




2023 Minnesota Nature Calendar

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America, its branches, and for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.

Non-Gmail Users Have Two Ways to Contribute


There is a <u>lite version of the same form</u> for those who don't have a Gmail account, which allows anyone to submit text-based contributions only.
