(Reminder that the RDNA started counting at "Y.R. 1," not at zero, meaning this is Y.R. 61.) In the upcoming days, we will be writing and (hopefully) ratifying a constitution, holding elections, and doing all the other things we need to do to become a grove. Hopefully, all of this will be done by Midsummer.

There's no color filter or editing of any kind on the adjacent photo of the evening sun. It's just a dry smoky day with really poor air quality. This put a bit of a damper on our plans for Grove outings and casual hangouts.

We did have a nice day of respite for our June casual meetup on the lawn at Como Park in Saint Paul. One thing I hadn't anticipated was the parking lots that were packed full. The very first parallel spot was available as I entered the park. I saw that as a good sign that there would be plenty of other spots, but all the others were full, and I quickly realized the people who looked like they were leaving were actually circling the lots and side streets looking for an open spot to park. After circling around three times myself, getting into a few traffic jams in the big parking lots, I found an open spot much farther away, and had to walk over a bridge to get to the meetup location.

We sat in the grass for a few hours, talked about druidry, and met a new person who was a chthonic occultist who was interested in learning more about our group. We painted a few rocks to donate to the Anoka Kindness Rock Garden, I painted a concrete owl for my garden to keep rabbits and a few

birds away, and neglected to get pictures of anything we painted. As I edit this newsletter I'm visiting family out of state, so we'll just have to imagine my painted owl for now. At the end, we went to the nearby Global Harmony meditation labyrinth, and walked contemplatively within the meandering lines.



News from Starved Rock Grove (Illinois) (also by John the Verbose)

A new Grove has been established along the Illinois River Valley! An older, oft overlooked tradition of the Reformed Druids of North America is for wandering Third Order Druids to establish a new or temporary Grove when traveling to help a new seeker join the RDNA. I drafted a Grove constitution in

duplicate: one for the new candidate to keep, and the other for the International Druid Archive at Carleton College. We met at Starved Rock State Park on solstice day. The Sherbaks arrived, and I was able to reunite Chris with his chalice, which had been inadvertently left behind at the Beltane gathering in Minnesota back in May. Our ritual site was the Council Overhang under the sandstone bluffs. We promptly voted to enact the Grove constitution, and then held a second vote ("the second of which shall be the first to be held after the first" per *The Book of the Law 1:12*) to elect Grove officers.





Sunshine, the local Druid seeker, provided spring water gathered from the same park about a month prior, which we used in our ceremonial pitcher to add the Waters-of-Life to. I was cautious to use my carnyx at full volume underneath the seemingly precarious rock ledge, but the reverberation was an acoustic treat not to be passed up. The winds responded immediately when I called upon the Spirit of the North, and the wood thrushes and eastern peewees sang when I called upon the Spirit of the East. Sunshine and Janet entered the First Order of the Reformed Druids of North America, to much rejoicing of the attendees!

We also gifted a consecrated bottle of the Waters-of-Life to Sunshine so that he can consecrate another seeker to the First Order, using the old Carleton Grove loophole: "anyone of the First or Second Orders [is] able to ordain another person to their own orders in the absence of an existing priest" (ARDA, pp. 234, 386). My personal interpretive caveat would be that pre-consecrated Waters would technically still be required, hence the gift. I also consecrated the remainder of the gallon jug of spring water as the Waters-of-Sleep. At the end of the ceremony I was able (for *my* first time ever) to use the script of *Order of Investiture for Archdruids* (by Savitzky, 1969) to pass the Grove baton on to a *provisional* Arch-Druid. Of course in this case I had to adjust the wording for someone who is only First Order, and the Grove would thus revert to a Protogrove. But Sunshine is now the duly invested First Order *Provisional* Arch-Druid of Starved Rock Protogrove of the Reformed Druids of North America!

This spring I started a backyard garden as a Gallo-Roman hortus. As I was hand-tilling the 8'x12' rectangle, I realized the topsoil is not more than two inches of dirt on top of glacial beach sand, meaning I'd need to bring some really good dirt. I made two inward paths leading to an aisle that ends at an ara style altar pillar. I also started working on a sundial for the garden. I'm not certain if the Gauls used sundials, but surely the stone circles from the Neolithic and Bronze Ages had been telling time fairly accurately for a few thousand years before the druids even existed.



Off and on in my exploration into the various pantheons of Celtic deities, I had searched fruitlessly for a distinct Celtic deity of *time*. I began to wonder if the Celtic nations and tribes historically just didn't place the same amount of emphasis on the passage of time (as it pertains to the divine) the way



Romans, Greeks, and other cultures did. Was time immaterial to them? Well, yes, time *is* immaterial and completely intangible. Some deities such as the Dagda get the aspect of time shoehorned into their associations, but that connection seemed tenuous at best.

Finally after thinking like a Roman and looking into *their* gods of time, I looked up the *Interpretatio Romana* of Saturn due to his associations with time and agriculture. I found a list that mentioned a Gaulish god: Arvalus. There are very few resources on Arvalus, but it is generally agreed that he was

an agricultural deity and also a god of time. Thus I made burnt offerings to Arvalus on my *ara* pillar and consecrated the garden to him.

The sundial is still a work in progress, but it is a marble cake plate with a brass rod gnomon and golden Roman numerals. I still need a few more AM and PM numerals since I only started with twelve, and the months between the Vernal and Autumnal equinoxes have more than 12 hours of sunlight each day.







Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.

Non-Gmail Users Have Two Ways to Contribute


There is a <u>lite version of the same form</u> for those who don't have a Gmail account, which allows anyone to submit text-based contributions only.
