

Slow Seattlish Spring

The first rains came in the month of snow, glum and frigid showers scattered by gusts. March carried on the fierce campaign of chilly winds that smoothed yet preserved the Long Ice. By April, rain came again early and stayed long, a guest with no plan to depart from a bed of soaked snow. The sun never came to declare an end to winter, so in its absence, there was lingering rain under steely bowers of cloud. Rain dripped from slick, dark branches; rain bored into banks of soggy snow; rain trickled in channels under the ice. Rain whispered the heavens' gossip by night and snatched away warmth from shuddering shoulders. Indeed, only rain cut into the long ice and eroded away piled snow to reveal the lawn's limp leftovers and earthen filth of winter's trodden tracks. This ice-sculpture April languished sunless, carven from ice and cloud.

The wait for spring felt long for its groundhog doom. One fair flash of summer heat convinced all the land that spring had come, but it belied a long abiding promise of coming growth. Impatient as a bride with dress in hand, the trees started buds that failed to unfurl for weeks. The frost flowers sprouted leaves that waited almost their frail lifetime to bud into bloom through timid lawns, and bulbs waited to burst out into light until new seeds opened their first roots. Weeks of winter-bleached brush and bare branches shocked me with unprecedented spectacles of empty air and hollow ground throughout the Grove. Chastened leaves and reluctant flowers stayed static in rains' susurrations.

But bounding for spring was the bumper-crop of animal activity! Within a snowfall's shimmering eye of winking heavens, I first met my new fox neighbor. Our paths, like that of another swift fox, cross monthly now in the stillness of midnight stirrings. Eagerly chasing the final frosts have flown fleets of herons, more than any time since the Summer of Stoic Herons. And amid the frenetic furred fetes of squirrel and rabbit, the frosty walls of my morning walks echo with birdsong. At a certain tree each day, a cardinal, then a jay, then a finch, then a robin – each tenant keeps its own address as well as schedule. What a blessing it is to greet individual, recognized families and know with confidence they know me too. Of them, the best neighbors are the blue jays, for they are not discouraged by my own songs, but sometimes join with the enthusiastic, off-tune amateurism of a children's choir.

My annual search for the scent of mud and pine was interrupted personally by many cares and worries. The shift toward summer eluded me, as did the time for planting. As sunlight grew, it flavored smoke-tinted scenes as if ready-made antique photographs, and by night, the moon wore a crown of hazy glory. Our few late storms brought but one taste of hail to the Grove, but one vista of terrible cloud tower passing at enormous distance. This season ended in afternoons of drifting dust and cottonwood down – its promise of growth and pledge for renewal in the season of life.

News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

It's been hot in Minnesota. Much of July was dry. And the smoky air from the wildfires made breathing feel like you have a roll of malfunctioning cigarette filters stuck in your throat. That means there's been a lot of time for inner workings. We created a new ritual segment for helping serendipity and synchronicity make itself apparent to prospective druids. It is basically a rite for fostering Awareness in others (specifically *good natured* people) to come to discover druidry on their own terms. We can't write a "Recruiting Ritual," that would be un-Reformed. But we can make druidry discoverable, and let the seekers decide whether or not to seek. Check out the ritual script in the *Right Rites* segment of this newsletter!

We pooled some ideas together for it when I presented a draft for the rite at our July casual hangout. There are also two additional higher orders in development: the Order of Belisama and the Order of Arvalus. Tentatively Belisama might actually be a side-order or a short-order: not necessarily requiring the candidate to be in the RDNA priesthood. One thing I'd like to do as well is explore developing additional Orders *not tied to any particular deity* to show support for Agnostic or Atheist druids in our communities who might not want the baggage (or perception thereof) of *theology* or *theolatry*.

We had six attendees at our Lughnasadh ritual at the beautiful Oakdale Nature Preserve, where the day was cool, clear, and the air was clean. We tried out our *Rite of Seeker Summoning* ritual segment. It flowed really well. At the sacrifice, the winds really spoke up with a resounding response. At the end we went on a pilgrimage to the old nemeton which is being overgrown by some sort of invasive cherry and Virginia Stickseed. Then we ended with a visit to the altar stone which the park moved in 2021.

Fir Bolg


The Fir Bolg, fourth of Ireland's waves, Slave refugees returned from Greece, Took one piece each for their five chiefs.

I advise Googling *safety tips for meeting people from the Internet* or something to that effect. Furthermore, this is not intended as a section for personals ads or soliciting hookups.







The Right Rites For Rampant Ritualists

Overview

This section is for sharing rituals, devotionals, meditations, or other liturgical contributions.

Rite of Seeker Summoning

A ceremonial segment to aid like-minded individuals to discover druidry serendipitously through divine synchronicity. To be inserted into the Common Order of Worship before the offering. Use any three offerings to enact this scenario. Suggestions include: ivy, male fern root, elder (any part, including berries), thistle, holly, chamomile (invites the good and wards off the bad), or wormwood (boosts the gain on the signal). Instructions are in square brackets. AD = Arch-Druid, PR = Preceptor By John the Verbose, Lughnasadh 2023

[Stand in a semicircle with a gap in the east, or direct the fellowship to form a gap in the east. This rite begins with excerpt of *The Mystery* from Customs 11:3]

AD: "Who is it who throws light into the meeting on the mountain?" Who is it who summons the seekers to stand among the gathered ones?

PR: We are the summoners! But it is Awareness and serendipity that we summon. The seekers must still come of their own accord. Let us make the first offering. [A volunteer burns or scatters first offering.]

AD: We call upon the Druids of the past, the ancient Druids who contemplated the mysteries of the Earth-Mother thousands of years ago. It is they who were there when druidism was new. And we call to the Revival Druids who began contemplating the divine three centuries ago. And to the modern Druids who sculpted our paths that evolved into what we have today. Join this rite and attend us now in our mission of fostering Awareness.

We call upon the Druids of the present, to those who stand among us in common fellowship. You... are... here. We are united in this moment. We are taking part in something greater than our own self-interests in this mission of fostering Awareness.

We call upon the Druids of the future. To those who do not yet realize that they already walk the path of druidry. To those who have not yet begun down that path. To those yet to be born. And to those Druids who shall make their life on other worlds and among the stars in the great celestial sea. Join this rite and attend us now in our mission of fostering Awareness.

PR: Countless times, those on the path of Druidry have lamented that they did not discover it sooner in life. Here is the appointed place, and now is the appointed time when we call upon all druids, past,

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present, and future. Let us make the second offering. [A volunteer burns or scatters second offering.]

AD: Together, we hereby summon the benevolent powers of synchronicity and serendipity, to bless those of good nature who would sincerely seek the path of Druidry in good faith. May they come unto Druidry not by us calling to them, but because they begin to seek it of their own accord, led by small discoveries that present themselves.

We call for these blessings upon the kind hearted, whether they have yet to discover druidry, whether they have yet to discover our Grove, or whether it is those who know of us and wish to attend but cannot. May the blessings of opportunity come into their Awareness, so that one day they too may stand among us...

PR: There is a gap in our circle: an opening in the East – the realm of new beginnings. Nature abhors a vacuum. Thus, together we stand to invite good natured seekers on their journey of self-discovery. Sometimes these discoveries happen in threes before we finally pay attention. Therefore, let us make a third offering. Then soon they too may stand here, closing the gap. [A volunteer burns or scatters second offering.]

AD: May our offerings find acceptance, and may serendipity and synchronicity descend upon the blessèd. May they discover druidism not because we summon them; but rather because we summon serendipity. So be it!

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- RDNA calendar (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

Connexus of Reformed Druids – C.O.R.D. Biquarterly is a free and publicly available newsletter for the Reformed Druids of North America, its branches, and for anyone else who might be interested. It follows in the footsteps of prior publications such as *A Druid Missal-Any* and *Druid Inquirer*. Connexus is an homage to the late Emmon Bodfish, who petitioned the Council of Dalon Ap Landu to update RDNA liturgical nomenclature to make it less churchlike and more unique. Connexus is Latin for connection (not exactly druidic, but I'm not complaining). Emmon's petition never gained traction (plus the Council had lost it's ability to gain a voting quorum and it had no chairperson at the time) but it seemed fitting to adopt this word for a publication that connects druids around the world.
