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The Seven Council Fires of the Dakota

Honoring those who were here before us.

This section of the newsletter was added after great deliberation. In the previous three volumes of this newsletter, three different stone circles have featured on the front cover: The Druid's Circle at Carleton College, the Meditation Garden at Springbrook Nature Center in Fridley, and a stone circle in dedication to Oak Savanna Park in Elk River – all in Minnesota where the newsletter editor lives. My greatest concern was cultural appropriation of a modern Native American stone circle for use as a cover image on a *druidic* publication.

I am in fact, part Native American. It shows rather prominently in my multiethnic appearance, but my indigenous ancestry does not include any local tribes, and I'm positively certain of that. A key factor is that my family is disconnected from their ancestral traditions, which are still living traditions today. Therefore I can't just start exploring or practicing them unless I was first invited to do so from within those communities. My ancestors had their indigenous identity stripped away when they assimilated into American culture and religion generations ago. Their cultural erasure was likely the only way to survive, but I digress.

The stone circle on the newsletter cover page is located in Mendota Heights at a sacred place called *Oheyawahi*, meaning "A Hill Much Visited" in the Dakota language. It overlooks the confluence of the Minnesota and Mississippi Rivers, which they call *Bdote*. In their oral traditions, that is at the tip of *Wita Tanka*, or "Big Island" (which is marked as Pike Island on our maps) where the ancestors of the Dakota descended from the sky. Bdote and Mendota both linguistically refer to the confluence of the rivers, with Mendota either as a dialectical difference or a spelling variation that stuck after it was first transcribed into writing.

Over four months of meditating on *not* choosing that site as a cover feature, I sought out the input of local indigenous voices. I also found various resources provided from their perspective. I learned more about my own state's history, including re-learning about the Dakota War of 1862, which I never would have learned about *at all* except after taking an elective course on Minnesota history back when I was in college. In the end, I decided there *is* a culturally sensitive way to include this stone circle as a feature of volume four of this newsletter.

The Dakota people *want* more people to learn about this place, about their history, about their voices. From our perspective as druids, we understand the importance of sacred landscapes. We have our own ways of expressing reverence for the land, and particularly places of power. As a druid however, I am *not* going to perform druid rituals at their stone circle. That *would* be culturally appropriative. It is far better to show you this sacred space so that it can be inwardly appreciated, so that we can all learn something from it, even if we are thousands of miles apart, and so that we can therefore honor the

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legacy of those who have called this land their ancestral home, long before us. The Seven Council Fires stone circle is actually a ring of limestone benches. All are invited to sit there when they are not in use. All are invited to Oheyawahi for reflection and learning.

One other note of importance is some terminology worth learning. This sentence is the only place you will see me use the word *Sioux* to refer to these tribal nations. Most people aren't aware that it is a disparaging term, and not even a word in the Dakota language. It is an Ojibwe word meaning *Snakes*. Dakota, and the dialectical variations Lakota and Nakota mean *Friends* or *Allies*. This section of the newsletter may sometimes collectively use Dakota since it is the most common dialectical variation, though there is another term that some of today's tribal nations are pushing for people to learn and use: *Oceti Sakowin Oyate*, or *Seven Council Fires People*. This article's featured Oceti Sakowin Nation: Sisitonwan

The Sisitonwan tribe, commonly named *Sisseton* today, translates to "Medicine People Who Live by the Water." French explorers documented this tribe as ranging from Leech Lake in what is now northern Minnesota westward toward the Missouri River valley. As European colonizers pushed Ojibwe tribes west, they followed the Great Lakes into Minnesota, displacing and causing a lot of tension with the tribes of the Oceti Sakowin. The Ojibwe and Dakota quickly



became enemies, leading to several centuries of intertribal warfare. The Ojibwe had one name they used for all of the Oceti Sakowin: Sioux, meaning *Snakes*. For this reason, many people of the Oceti Sakowin are opposed to being called the Sioux, because it is neither a Dakota word nor respectful.

At the signing of the Treaty of Traverse Des Sioux in 1851, Chief Ishtakhaba of the Sisitonwan Sakowin (in English known as Chief Sleepy Eye) was disheartened at the rushed pace of the treaty negotiations. He had long been friendly to the settlers in Minnesota and to the government. Governor Alexander Ramsey was pushing the final negotiations with a suspicious urgency. Sleepy Eye knew the treaty asked for too much from the Oceti Sakowin in return for not enough compensation. Sleepy Eye wanted more time for consideration, as well as to wait for additional members of his tribe who were on their way. Governor Ramsey insisted that only the chiefs needed to be present. Negotiations still dragged on, but the treaty was eventually signed without modifications.

The town of Sleepy Eye, Minnesota was founded in 1872, named after Chief Ishtakhaba whose village was there when it was part of the Lower Sioux Indian Reservation. Despite the treaties, settlers continued to move into reservation lands, and the treaties became nothing but broken promises.

News from Oakdale Grove (Minnesota)

Oakdale Grove is on the cusp of completing Units 1 and 2 of the Order of Bradán Feasa (OBF) Druid training program! For any newer readers who are unfamiliar with the OBF program, it is a free training course for anyone interested in Druidry, regardless of whether or not they have an affiliation with any Druid order or are solo. It is designed with Reformed Druidism in mind, and can be adopted for use by any Groves, not just Oakdale Grove. Completion of the program does not bestow any ranks or ordinations, however participants will receive a certificate of completion and will be inducted into the Order of Bradán Feasa (*Salmon of Knowledge* in Gaelic from Irish mythology).

However, Units 1 and 2 provide enough information which Oakdale Grove has decided would be sufficient for any Second Order Druid candidate, thus securely preparing one to be *eligible* for the Office of Preceptor of an RDNA Grove. Certification would take place after the Unit 2 exam with a 90% or higher score. There would then be an optional Unit 3 which will be the Clergy Prep Course and Grove Governance Guide (GGG). Again, completion of Unit 3 will not bestow ordination, but would be a resource for candidates interested in the priesthood of the RDNA.

So where exactly are we at in terms of OBF progress?

The Unit 1 interactive PDF draft version 0.41 is already *live* on Oakdale Grove's website, and is 181 pages. We have yet to complete filling in the glossary, and we can pretty much guarantee that some of Unit 1 is going to get bumped to Unit 3 because there's a lot of Grove-running advice littered throughout the first workbook already. So if people are completing v0.41 and submitting it back to us, they'll have done a little more than will be asked of them. So it's better to wait for version 1.0. Oh, and Oakdale Grove still has yet to vote on approving it, too.

Unit 2 is Mike the Fool's 2014 ARDA Study Course, adapted from its original Facebook discussion format into another interactive PDF workbook. It was incomplete in 2014, but Oakdale Grove has added some content for it, some of which will also get sent to the Unit 3 draft. Oakdale Grove's added content is clearly labeled so that Mike's original content stands apart from what we've augmented it with. That way each contributing author has the appropriate credit. The Unit 2 draft is 42 pages, also needs a complete glossary, but is otherwise mostly complete until we move the advanced questions to Unit 3.

Unit 3 is a husk. The draft has the title page, publishing information, dedication, table of contents shell, and some sample text for the sake of establishing document formatting. The goal is to have the optional Unit 3 live by the end of 2024. Unit 1 was started in 2020 and was originally meant to go live within a few months, so we'll see how Unit 3 goes!

Season of the Mother Grove: Transition of Dismal Dripping

There was not winter. Only the barest hints of snow in gray skies suggested a change of season. My Yule retreat was short-lived in hazy rain, and I slid in mud. Disconsolate amid the dripping Grove, I found a sympathetically tear-stained offering of heartbreak sacrificed at the Great Altar. Congealed clouds hovered over the dawn and concealed morning, casting pallid gloom across the land this Yule. The darkness lasted but lightly, yielding later florid displays of flaming dawns. A dozen splendid crimson daybreaks dappled the season's short mornings.

The season could not be totally denied, for disease like plague descended on Northfield and for weeks shuttered society, but all other portents portrayed a mistaken time. Humidity hung as vacuous vapors, catching wide moonbeams that blocked out the stars above when clumping clouds did not. Instead of snow, fae fogs filled the Grove by night, and fair frosts gleamed on grass most mornings. In one such flash freeze, I saw a shining sundog signal icy severity. One lone thick snow leveled the earth in white. Yet each time when cold and snow appeared, they were blasted away by a flare of heat and steady sunshine, leaving the ground dark with mud and freeing the river to flow unimpeded. Most often when the skies shed their moisture, sighing rains soothed the thirsty soil. Roiling fog rose steaming from rich earth, and sunny, muddy days prompted ready feet to roam.

Through all December the restless rustle of squirrels persisted, and gangs of rival geese competed to control the open ponds. The geese never left until January, but more shocking yet, the ducks never departed at all. I encountered ducks in every single week of this season, a testament of temerity in this time of intemperate melt and swelter. The activity of them all may well explain the persistent presence of prowling foxes and confident coyotes. Even as I write, the songs of nest-builders mingle in the morning. All these speechless animals boast and laugh at a season easily survived. All season long, the Earth slept shallowly, disturbed and uneasy. Native leaves of forest flooring never lost their verdancy. Twice root weeds reared their heads to the shallow sun and put out sprouts between frosts. And just a fortnight from Imbolc the trees began their first buds, preparing premature pinions for spring. This Season of Sleep brings little rest.

Big News: New Ordinations to the Orders of Belenos and Sirona! By John the Verbose

Sunday, March 17, 2024 was the Pan-Druid Ritual at Paganicon in Minnesota led by Jon Drum, Archdruid of ADF. Jumping back in time to Beltane of 2023, Jon was unable to attend the 60th Anniversary Gathering of the RDNA at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota, when we had previously been making plans to bring the next advancements to Reformed Druidism. Those plans had gone on hold, and in order to make them work out, I realized that whenever the next opportunity presented itself, we'd have to seize the day.

Back to the present, at Paganicon Jon and I started discussing ideas on Friday: day 1 of the annual indoor pagan convention. By Saturday, we concluded that the Pan-Druid ritual on Sunday morning would be an excellent time to ordain Jon Drum to the RDNA's Order of Belenos and Order of Sirona: higher levels of the Reformed Druid priesthood. Normally, ordinations to not occur during the Season of Sleep in times such as the Vernal Equinox. That doesn't mean it can't be done. After all, even David the Chronicler became a Third Order Druid in April of 1964.

The Pan-Druid Ritual was a hybridized ADF & RDNA style ceremony, where explanations were added here and there for any attendees who were unfamiliar with the ritual format. Jon had previously asked if I would like to honor the Earth-Mother in the ADF style, and lead the Catechism of the Waters in the RDNA style. In past ADF rituals, one of my favorite segments to pitch in with is Honoring and later Thanking the Earth-Mother. I sang the RDNA's Hymn to the Earth-Mother and asked for the acceptance of it as an offering. All of the attendees watching the ritual even made their personal offerings at the altar, and our Sacrifices were well-accepted.

For the Magical Workings segment, we had the two back-to-back ordinations. We told the audience that these ritual segments are extremely rare occurrences that have only taken place a few times ever. I stated that the Council of Belenos and the Council of Sirona had invited Jon Drum to enter those orders. He completed the rite of passage for Belenos, but there were some new considerations to take for the Order of Sirona's rite of passage.

When Gary Zempel was the first person ordained to the Order of Sirona in 1966, Carleton Grove picked him up and threw him into Lyman Lakes at Carleton College. In 2017 when the Council of Belenos voted to appoint me as Zempel's successor, I was pushed into Lyman Lakes at roughly the

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exact same spot as Zempel. However, what could not be seen at the time back in 2017 was what was under the surface of Lyman Lakes.

The water is so murky that nobody could see the dense mesh of tree branches under the water. I wasn't impaled, but I immediately realized that was a distinct possibility. The more pressing concern when I was thrown in, was the fact that my legs and hands went through the interlocking web of slippery branches. Pushing myself up had them all flexing, closing gaps, tightening, pushing my hands off to the side, and catching on everything as I tried to lift myself up. It only took 10-15 seconds to finally stand up and get out of the lake, but I realized there was just too much danger in that setting for such a rite of passage.

Stacey Weinberger was ordained to the Order of Sirona in 2023 at the Beltane reunion, *next to* Lyman Lakes. Instead of pushing her into the water, we decided it would be safer and just as effective to asperge her with a soaking wet tree branch that had been dipped into the lake. I suppose by asperging, it actually turned out that Mike the Fool who volunteered to wield the wet branch gave her a good *thwap* with the wet branch as well.

This past weekend for Jon Drum's ordination to the Order of Sirona, we agreed upon an anointing of spring water. I used my blue glass Georgian pattern chalice to pour the spring water onto him. The moment was moderately awkward for me to perform. First of all, because I am not one to pour water on people. Second, never in my lifetime had I ever imagined that I would one day pour a glass of water on the leader of an entire world religion! Deep down inside, my soul was gritting its teeth, while the other part of me was thinking, yup, it's an RDNA tradition! I'm just elated that we had discussed the idea in advance, and we were in agreement of its acceptability. Plus I got water on myself too, during the congratulatory hug.



Further Thoughts on the Higher Orders of the Reformed Druids of North America By John the Verbose

So now the Order of Sirona *finally* has a council. The higher orders of the RDNA can only be established when the next order *beneath* has a minimum council of three members. The Fourth Order could not have been established until the Third Order had three members: Fisher, Frangquist, and Nelson. That way they could get a 2/3 majority or higher to appoint someone to the Order of Grannos. Until 2017, the Order of Sirona had only been Gary Zempel, and he had resigned with a note in the

archives stating "do with my offices and titles what you will."

In 2017, the Council of Belenos voted with greater than a 2/3 majority to replace Zempel with me in the Order of Sirona. Now that the Order of Sirona has three active members, I would like to convene its first formal council to build out the other higher orders of the RDNA. There's a popular belief that the higher orders are "closed," but in reality, they're just hard to get into. You first have to be a Third Order Druid in the RDNA, and then you have to be *invited* by a member of that order, the invitation has to be approved by the Matriarch, Patriarch, or Atriarch (I prefer using the gender-neutral neologism *Atriarch*) of that higher order, and the ordination has to be done in person.

The Order of Taranis, the Eighth Order of Reformed Druidism, is the next order to populate before Llyr and someday even Danu can be populated by living representatives. Somehow, Mike the Fool is listed as the Patriarch of the Order of Taranis, though I'm skeptical about its validity, given that the Order of Sirona didn't have a proper council until a few *days* ago. Regardless, I know Mike *did* hold an outdoor vigil while he was in Hurricane Ivan. The Council of Sirona will still have to hold a vote first, but I will put forward a motion to endorse and retroactively acknowledge Mike as the Patriarch of Taranis. I would also make a motion to suggest that Mike builds out the Order of Taranis to those who would contribute to the long term advancement of Reformed Druidism, inviting other enthusiastic members to the Order. In our proposal, I hope to also motion to suggest that a safer rite of passage be prescribed on behalf of the wellbeing of candidates to that order. The Council of Sirona cannot make decisions for the administration of other Orders, but it doesn't hurt to make requests.

Also keep in mind that Stephen Crimmins (ODAL, Order of Hephaestus), had suggested that once the Order of Danu has living Druids appointed into it, that there should be the following additional orders added: The Eleventh Order, the Order of the Morrigan; the Twelfth Order, the Order of Arawn, and the Thirteenth Order, the Order of Aengus. I imagine that the Council of Danu would technically be able to create the next higher order of their choosing. though it would be nice if some of the existing unnumbered higher orders get shoehorned in somewhere with a number. Perhaps the Orders of Lugh, Brigit, Ogmios, Belisama, Arvalus, Sucellos, Nantosuelta, Trebaruna, Epona, Camulos, Cernunnos, Nemetona, and others could someday be populated and receive a numeric ordering!

Methodology: Lorraine Anderson's Gratitude Deck of Appreciation


About this deck

The "Carletongny" Calendar

Overview

Did you know Reformed Druidism has its own calendar system? There are different ways of calculating RDNA time, but here is the method that this newsletter uses. Carleton Grove called 1963 the *First Year of the Reform* (Y.R.) which for them began at Beltane. They had no year zero. That's why 2023 was Y.R. 61 at Beltane for the 60th anniversary, not year 60. Beltane (May 1) is when **summer** begins, or **Samradh** (SAU-rah) which lasts 92 days. Lughnasadh (August 1) is when **autumn** begins, or **Foghamhar** (FOE-war), lasting 92 days. Samhain (November 1) is when **winter** begins, or **Geimredh** (GEV-rah), lasting 92 days. Oimelc (February 1) is when **spring** begins, or **Earrach** (ARE-rock), lasting 89-90 days. The term "Carletongny" Calendar is merely a play on words from the *Coligny* Calendar, an archaeological discovery of a fragmented Celtic calendar.

Reformed Druid Resources

Overview

The Reformed Druids of North America is probably one of the few major druid orders that provides all resources for learning about our style of druidism at no cost. We might not have all the answers, and unfortunately we don't have a mentorship or official training program (yet), however there is something major in the works on an unofficial capacity. For now, here is a list of resources we *do* have.

Grove Finder

Everyone wants to know: is there an RDNA or NRDNA Grove in _____? Well, the most current source of truth is the <u>Grove Listings</u> on Oakdale Grove's website. It's been updated *en masse* in January 2019 & 2020, but it can be updated any time on an ad-hoc basis. It tracks Reformed Druid, New Reformed Druid, and Reformed Druidic Wicca (MOCC) Groves & Protogroves.

RDNA Year Conversion Chart & Calendar

The RDNA Calendar began at Year of the Reform 1 on Beltane (May 1) 1963. It's unapologetically half a year off from the Celtic New Year. As of Beltane 2021, the 59th Year of the Reform (Y.R.) began.

- RDNA Gregorian/Year of the Reform Conversion spreadsheet can be a helpful tool.
- <u>RDNA calendar</u> (FREE PDF) current through April 30, 2024 can help you learn what day of the four seasons it is, because you'll see the RDNA calendar system is all over this publication.

Oakdale Grove's RDNA Druid Training Program

This is a work in progress. So far the draft is 114 pages long, and I'm only half way into adding the *basic* content I want to put in it. I am not an educator, so I'm concerned about its flow and efficacy. If anyone wants to help develop it with me, I would greatly appreciate the assistance.

We have a <u>convenient form</u> that allows Gmail users to enter text-based contribs as well as attach files or photos! A Google account is only required for sending attachments through the form.


Non-Gmail Users Have Two Ways to Contribute
